O house of Israel, cannot I do with you as this potter? saith the Lord. Behold, as the clay is in the potter's hand, so are ye in mine hand, O house of Israel. Jer. 18:6.

The art of fashioning the plastic clay into various vessels of beauty and utility is one of the most ancient and interesting of the arts and industries of

men. Ancient ruins and museums of the world are full of the curious and graceful specimens of ceramic taste and loveliness, more costly even than the precious metals. There is no figure that more strikingly suggests the lessons of divine grace and the work of the Father's hand in moulding the lives and characters of His people according to His will.

There is a lesson suggested by the clay. When we walk out in the fields, and along the riverbank and see the

clay, how perfectly useless it is, but in the sight of God, how valuable. Have you ever thought of the many beautiful things God has made from the common clay? It is the material out of which He made the world, and probably the shining constellations above us. Out of the clay He brings the verdure and bloom we see in garden and valley and field. Then when we look still higher we see that man, the crowning work of God's

evolve its own destiny. It remains in utter uselessness and helplessness. How like the clay we are! Without God's hand to mould and shape our lives and characters, how far short we fall from the thought and purpose of God for us!

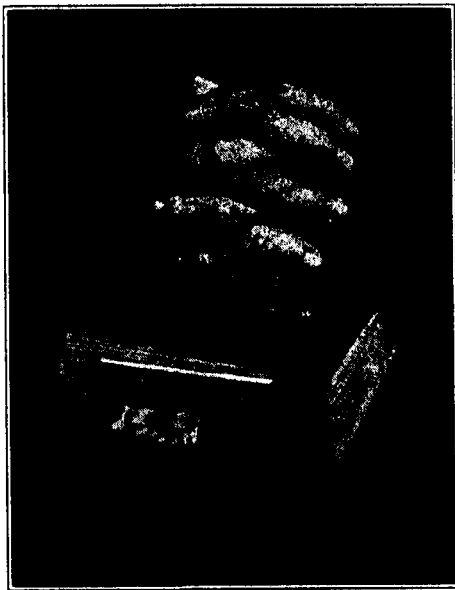
We hear much today about God's power or the need of God's power. I wonder sometimes if God is going to pour out His Spirit in any marked way

until He can find a company of people who realize they are nothing but just common, ordinary clay. This is one of the most difficult lessons we have to learn, and most profitable.

This is illustrated in the Old Testament in the story of Jacob wrestling with the angel. Names were given in those days not because they were thought pretty or from mere fancy, but every

name had significance, meaning and character. Jacob bore the name he did because the word meant "supplanter." The character or nature of Jacob was shown in the name he had. You remember how the angel wrestled all night with him, and it was not until morning that the angel touched him and he broke down. What was the one question the angel asked him? Jacob really wanted a blessing; he prayed, no doubt, long, fervently and earnestly. But what was

The Gospel

Ernest S. Williams

The gospel is good news and is built on a tried foundation. It was announced by John the Baptist and confirmed by our Lord Jesus, but before either of them began their earthly ministry it was the gospel "which He had promised aforetime by His prophets in the holy Scriptures."

After His resurrection Jesus showed that the foundation of Christian faith had been laid in Old Testament times, by unfolding to the two disciples on the way to Emmaus the things which Moses, the Psalms, and the Prophets had written concerning Himself. Peter quoted from the Old Testament to show that the blessings of the gospel were fulfilled of promises made in old times, "This is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel," and Paul, when defending his ministry said, "Saying none other things than Moses and the Prophets did say."

The Scriptures are a unit, both Old and New Testaments, "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope." Some have thought that since the New Testament time has come, the writings of the Old Testament have no further place for us. A greater mistake it would be difficult to make. The central theme of both Testaments is our Lord Jesus. Beginning with Adam we find Him declared, and as time went on we find Him through prophetic word and ritualistic type more and more unfolded.

To Adam He is seen in the covering of skins and the word to the serpent, "Thou shalt bruise his heel, but he shall bruise thy head." The sacrifice of Abel was accepted rather than that of Cain because in it was seen the necessity of the shedding of blood to make reconciliation. From the promises made to Adam ever onward and ever bolder were the promises made until Isaiah reached the acme of atonement promise, in his description of Christ from His lowly birth as a "plant out of a dry ground," through His sacrificial death "wounded for our transgressions, bruised for our iniquities," and on to the time when by His resurrection and triumph "He shall prolong His days, and the pleasure of the Lord shall prosper in His hand. He shall see of the travail of His soul and shall be satisfied."

Christ is human and Divine, "the seed of David according to the flesh" "the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead." As seed of David He is David's son, fully human, yet heir to

all that David was promised as to kingdom and power.

David would build a house of worship. God saw the desire and accepted the willingness. But God would not be outdone in giving, so He promised David that He would build David a house and established his kingdom forever. This was an unconditional promise not fulfilled in Solomon, or any other king that has reigned in Israel. All of Israel went into captivity and lost the kingdom. Out of the wreckage only one remains whose genealogy proves him heir to the promise made to David. It is our Saviour and Lord. He is David's son and shall yet come "crowned with many crowns," "to receive for himself a kingdom." It will be "an everlasting kingdom that shall not pass away."

But before He could be made king, He must suffer and die. This is that over which Israel stumbled. How could their king be humiliated and brought to seeming defeat? Isaiah gives the answer, "He is despised and rejected of men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief." "He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities, the chastisement of our peace was upon Him." The royal son of David must die to "make His soul an offering for sin."

But God would not leave His soul in hell, neither would He suffer His holy One to see corruption. Having "tasted death for every man" God intervened and raised Him from the dead the third day. Henceforth He lives forever and is now seated at the right hand of the Majesty on high "ever living to make intercession for us," and "henceforth ex-

pecting till His enemies be made His footstool," holding "the keys of hell and of death."

The commission to preach the gospel is "go ye therefore and teach all nations," and the purpose of the commission is "to win obedience to the faith among all nations." The gospel does not drive, it wins. It is a ministry of love and of reconciliation. Its tone is that of beseeching, not of driving. Paul was an apostle, but he never sought to drive people to obedience. Rather we hear him saying, "I beseech you therefore brethren by the mercies of God." In the gospel "God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them," and in making us ministers of the gospel we are commissioned "In Christ's stead to beseech men that they be reconciled to God."

Give us, Lord, less of the thunders of Sinai, less of the driving, demanding spirit of carnal leadership, and more of the broken, tender, suffering, patient beseeching of the true minister of the glad tidings of great joy. He who drives and domineers is a grievous shepherd, which he who leads is like unto his Lord.

The purpose of the gospel is to effect a moral and spiritual change in man. Redemption touches every part of the human nature. Its moral effect is shown by the one receiving it becoming "a new creature," with sanctified purpose and disposition. Its spiritual effect is shown in the blessing of the Holy Ghost, and a worship of God in spirit and in truth. Disobedience and rebellion against God are to be overcome through submission to the will of God, faith in divine promises and in the Saviour, and through the power of the Holy Ghost.

Those who believe the gospel enter into a close relationship to God. They become "the called of Jesus Christ." In them is fulfilled His promise, "For ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you." It gives one such a comforting feeling to know that one is upheld by Christ instead of our having to attempt to uphold Christ. Some remind us so often of what we must do to serve God. They turn our attention to ourselves, and often away from our Redeemer and what He has already done and what He will continue to do. Without Him we can do nothing. In our flesh dwelleth no good thing. If we are to succeed as happy Christians we must see our place "the called of Jesus Christ," and find in Him "our life." Stormy times are all about us. He must hide us "in the cleft of the Rock" and He will perfect that which concerneth us.

Not only are we the called of Jesus Christ, we are also "beloved of God." God is our Father and we are special recipients of His love. He "so loved the world that He gave," but who can meas-

ure the "what manner of love" which He has bestowed upon His children? A Memorial Day Offering to Aid Our Aged Ministers

The only Benevolence sanctioned by the General Council is that of aid for our aged ministers. And even this benevolence has been placed on a voluntary basis. No churches are assessed for any purpose in our Assemblies of God fellowship. Needs are presented to each, however, and all are given the privilege of giving freely out of the abundance of the heart, as God has prospered us.

Twice a year, the General Treasurer is authorized to call this need to your attention. All pastors are urged to give their people an opportunity to give a Memorial Day offering on Sunday, May 29th. Of course, if that day is not convenient, any other day will do, just so the offering is accepted and forwarded to the General Treasurer for this purpose.

Applications are constantly being received for assistance from this fund. Only those who can qualify according to the provisions in the By-Laws are accepted, and each case is judged on its own merits. When it has been ascertained there is a real need which cannot be met in any other way, the application is acted upon favorably and aid given.

Thirty-three ministers or widows of ministers are now receiving monthly aid

from this fund. Five ministers who had received aid have now gone on to be with the Lord. One minister is suffering from high blood pressure and inflammatory rheumatism and has been near the border line several times. Another, who has no earthly relatives to care for him is being cared for by kind friends even though he is helpless and must be waited upon constantly. The offerings from this Benevolent Fund help greatly in giving the necessary financial relief.

You have responded splendidly to the need each time it has been presented. We

know you will not fail this time. Remember that Sunday, May 29th, has been set aside as a day of Memorial for our faithful aged and infirm ministers. Send all offerings to J. R. Flower, Gen. Treasurer, 336 W. Pacific Street, Springfield, Mo.

God had separated Abraham from all the idolatries of Ur of the Chaldees, and neither Abraham nor Isaac was attracted by any of the idolatries of Canaan.

But Abraham knew that his son needed a wife. So he sent a trusted servant to find one among his godly relatives. Isaac was quite willing to leave the choice with his father, and with the one his father sent. Eliezer, being in the way, was led by the Lord and was enabled to bring back Rebekah, a worthy bride for his master's son. Was Isaac satisfied? Perfectly. He loved the one of God's choice. And Rebekah was fully satisfied with the one God had chosen for her.

The world has many attractions and many allurements. But God calls those that are His, to come out from the world and be separate. Many are allured by the things of the world. "Look at that lovely home! Look at that beautiful car!" And they covet this and that of earth—forgetting that all of these things are to perish with the using. The Lord tells his own, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world." He bids those that are His to set their affections on things above, not on the things of the earth; not on the temporal but on the eternal.

Be content to let God choose for you. He knows your need. He will not fail to choose the best for you—that which will be for your eternal welfare.

Paul had a revelation of what was God's best—that he "might know Him," the Son of God, that he might "win Christ." But, Paul, are you not satisfied with your experience? Did you

not have a meeting with Jesus of Nazareth on the Damascus road? Were you not healed of blindness, and did you not receive the Holy Spirit when Ananias laid hands on you? Did you not go down to Arabia and get marvelous revelations there concerning the grace of God? Did you not personally know Peter and John and the greatest pillars of the Church? Did you not have a great meeting at Antioch, and were not you and Barnabas chosen to go forth as missionaries to the Gentiles? Have you not had marvelous experiences in preaching the gospel? Have you not seen great signs and wonders—even a great earthquake down there at Philippi?

"Yes, but there is something yet greater. I have not yet fully apprehended that for which He has apprehended me. But this one thing I do, forgetting all things that are past—all those wonderful experiences—I press on for the prize ahead."

And what is that prize?

"To win Christ. He is the prize. It is He I long to know, entering into a union and communion with Him hitherto unknown."

Will the Lord meet a heart that has a longing? He put the very longing within—and He will satisfy it. Ask Paul when you get over yonder whether it was worth while to press on for this prize, and you will surely hear him say, "A billion times, yes."

Present Day Events in the Light of Scripture

RUSSIA'S CLOSED CHURCHES

Reports *World Dominion*: "A favorite method of closing places of worship is to burden them with a tax too high to be paid. A report from Moscow states that during 1937 the O. G. P. U. closed on account of unpaid taxes about 1,900 churches, synagogues and mosques."

PALESTINE'S POPULATION

According to *Jewish Chronicle*: Palestine's population was estimated to have been 1,335,253 persons at December 31st, 1937, compared with 1,320,872 at the end of the previous quarter on September 30th, and with 1,300,151 at December 31st, 1936. The distribution at the end of 1937 was: Moslems 816,891 or 61.2 per cent; Jews 395,845 or 29.6 per cent; Christians 110,874 or 8.3 per cent; and others 11,643 or 0.9 per cent.

THE NERVE CENTER OF THE WORLD

Writes D. M. Panton: "Teeming with races and religions, the Mediterranean has seen the rise and fall of Arabs, Jews, Phœnicians, Persians, Babylonians, Assyrians, Egyptians, Berbers, and Ottomans on its Asiatic side. Its African shores saw the might of the Pharaohs, Greeks and Romans, and Turks. Therefore the Mediterranean, out of which the Roman Empire is to be resurrected, is the nerve center of the world and the nest of the modern crisis."

THRONELESS BUT NOT FAITHLESS

Revelation reports that Ex-Emperor Haile Selassie, gave a radio broadcast in which he appealed to the world to recognize the Spirit of Christ in every relationship. He has been in close touch with missionaries of the Bible Church Missionary Society, the fundamental wing of the Church of England in the great missionary work carried on by the official church. Recently Haile Selassie announced that his son, Prince Asrati, who is fifteen years old, was entering the academic department of the Bible College at Swansea, England, in order to begin his training in preparation for life service as a Christian missionary.

RAINBOW IN THE CLOUD

Many will remember the terrible gas explosion that blasted the life out of 278 children in a school of New London, Texas. Has this disaster shaken people's faith in God? On the contrary, reports a news dispatch, it has led to a "spiritual rebirth."

"It is as though an entire city, small though it is, has turned to religion to find comfort for the loss of sons and daughters who went to their deaths so early in life, leaving empty chairs behind in hundreds of homes.

"Part of the credit for this spiritual awakening goes, incidentally, to John Lumpkin. He lost a child in the explosion, and now he virtually takes the responsibility for the regular attendance of every New London church-goer."

Let us pray that the international upheavals of today may drive people to God and to His Word.

AFRAID OF RELIGION

"If the Russian youth ever discover that there is any merit in religion," Stalin wrote last year, to the Militant Godless Association of his home town, "our Communist regime is doomed."

A Sermon in Miniature

MINISTERING GRACE OR POISON—WHICH?

"Death and life are in the power of the tongue." Prov. 18:21. Paul shows how the tongue can be used to edify and minister grace to the hearers. Eph. 4:29. James describes the tongue as transmitting deadly poison to set on fire the natural man. James 3:6.

I. The tongue ministering grace; i. e., giving forth blessing.

1. Precious words. "The tongue of the just is as choice silver." Prov. 10:20.

2. Wise words. "The mouth of the just bringeth forth wisdom." Prov. 10:31.

3. Pleasant words. "The words of the pure are pleasant words." Prov. 15:26.

4. Cheering words. "A good word maketh it (the heart) glad." Prov. 12:25.

5. Delivering words. "A true witness delivereth souls." Prov. 14:25.

6. Sparring words. "He that hath knowledge spareth his words." Prov. 17:27.

7. Seasonable words. "A word spoken in due season, how good is it!" Prov. 15:23.

II. The tongue ministering poison; i. e., giving forth sin.

1. Harping words. "He that repeateth a matter (harpeth on a matter, R. V.) separateth very friends." Prov. 17:9.

2. Rash words. "There is that speaketh (rashly, R. V.) like the piercings of a sword." Prov. 12:18

3. Talebearing words. "He that goeth about as a talebearer revealeth secrets." Prov. 20:19.

4. Backbiting words. "A whisperer alienateth his friend." Prov. 16:28, R. V. m.

5. Foolish words. "The mouth of fools poureth out foolishness." Prov. 15:2.

6. Flattering words. "A man that flattereth his neighbor spreadeth a net for his feet." Prov. 29:5.

7. Lying words. "A lying tongue hateth those that are afflicted by it." Prov. 26:28. III. *The tongue and the personal life.*

"He that keepeth his mouth keepeth his life." Prov. 13:3. Unnecessary words diffuse strength which should be kept for other demands, and often lead to trouble. Prov. 21:23. Let all saints who long to be approved of God make no hasty promises—even to pray for some need—which they cannot fulfill. Let their simplest "Yes" or "No" be reliable. Let us learn the power of the Cross to sever from the old life, and the power of the Holy Spirit to impart the new. Then the Spirit will use our lips to pour out rivers of life and blessing.

A BRAND PLUCKED FROM THE FIRE

A number of years ago, in Cordele, Ga., my husband came home one night and said to me, "Corde, I heard today of the most desperate character I ever heard of. He seems literally to be possessed of a devil."

"It is a Negro who was arrested for murder. He had killed several people. They caught him and brought him before Judge Whipple for trial, but he was so violent, and so strong, and was cursing every breath, using the most vile language conceivable, they had to chain and gag him before they could try him. He is now in jail chained to the wall, but they say he has not ceased one minute to curse and use the most awful language so that it makes the keepers of the prison quake."

Upon hearing all this, somehow the Spirit came upon me with this thought, "No one has ever told him of the love of Jesus." The impression came to me that his desperation had been brought about by harsh treatment and ignorance of Jesus' love.

I cannot explain why, but the spirit of prayer was so upon me for that poor black man that I could not keep from praying, and all night my prayers, with groanings which could not be uttered, went through me, and I could hardly wait for the morning, to go to him.

Soon after breakfast I announced to my husband, "I must go to that Negro and tell him Jesus loves him." My husband turned pale and said, "It is impossible for me to

get off and go with you today, and I hate for you to go without me." I said, "I must go. God will be with me." Later I was minded to call a saintly woman who was visiting in the town. She readily agreed to go with me.

When we reached the jail and told the sheriff what we wanted, he said, "Mrs. Stead" (for he knew me), "I cannot permit you to go into the presence of that brute. You would not wish to hear such language; I myself, never conceived of such vile language."

I said, "Yes, but God can seal his lips as He did the lions' mouths for Daniel."

At last he consented. He went before us and asked the man if he wanted to see us. He said, "Yes." And when we went in there we beheld him just as we had been told—chained to the wall, hands and feet. But just as we had said, God had literally sealed his lips, they were pressed tightly together as he looked at us. There was nothing I could do but stand there and shed tears, too full to speak. After a few moments God gave me utterance, and I said, "Jesus loves you. Jesus loves you"—over and over again. Then the tears began to stream down his face. That was my message, "Jesus loves you." No more could I say.

The lady who was with me prayed. God gave her power, but I know not what she said. We went out.

Later we learned that after we left he sent for the Negro preacher and confessed his sins. He was afterwards hanged.

Cowper, the poet, wrote that hymn, "There is a fountain filled with blood drawn from Emmanuel's veins." Every sinner can say Amen to one verse of that hymn:

"The dying thief rejoiced to see
That fountain in his day;
And there may I, though vile as he,
Wash all my sins away."

A few weeks ago it was the editor's pleasure to attend services in Brother Nash's assembly in Cincinnati, Ohio. He noticed many members bringing prayer requests, on specially printed cards. During service each request was prayed for by the pastor, the whole assembly uniting with him.

Questions and Answers

Will all Jews go through the Great Tribulation, or will it be only the 144,000? Some tell us there will be saved Jews who will go to meet Christ in the Rapture.

The Great Tribulation mentioned in Matt. 24:21 will be distinctly Jewish, Jerusalem being the center of attack. It is indicated that the Antichrist will make the restored temple the seat of his authority after he has broken his covenant with Israel. 2 Thess. 2:4; Dan. 9:27; 12:1. Nations seeking possession of the land will station their armies on the fields of Megiddo. Rev. 16:14-16. There will be a great battle, often spoken of as the Battle of Armageddon, which will be fought probably by the Antichrist and those with him against an invading force. It is probable that the center of this last battle will be in the Valley of Jehoshaphat (Joel 3:1, 2), just outside the city of Jerusalem. Israel will be delivered by the coming of Christ to Mount Olivet as their King. Zech. 14:1-4. Revelation 7 speaks of 144,000 of those of Israel who will be sealed. These are likely the same 144,000 seen in Revelation 14. At the present time both Jews and Gentiles may be saved by grace and thus become members of the Body of Christ. Those being saved now have the promise of meeting Jesus when He comes for the church.—E. S. W.

Nicaragua and a New Milestone

The third annual conference for the Pentecostal work has just passed, causing us to be grateful to God for the blessings received. The conference was held early in March, in the little town of El Sauce. There was a larger number of out of town visitors than had ever attended a meeting here. More than eighty persons from different parts were present and were cared for during these days. Many of them walked long distances. One pastor brought his wife and four children from a town seventy-five miles away, covering at least a hundred and ten miles of the one hundred fifty on foot. A couple about seventy years of age came from a point forty miles distant. They were converted about three months ago. God's blessing was evident during the entire conference and we were happy to see evidence of real growth, not only in numbers but in spiritual character and in the knowledge of the Lord.

The town where the conference was held is fanatically anti-Protestant. They have what they consider to be a miraculous image, which they believe has human flesh, and because they are taught to be afraid to touch it, they go on under the delusion. It is not surprising, therefore, that there has been much opposition to the gospel. The broken tiles in the roof of the little church give testimony to the number of rocks that have been hurled in on the believers during the services.

Since the church was too small for the crowds attending the services, the night meetings were held in the open. About two hundred people listened nightly to the

preaching of the Word. One evening as the altar call was being given a stone hurled into the crowd struck a woman on the eyebrow. The blood gushed from the wound but while she was being taken care of by friends the call continued and four souls responded publicly to the invitation. The gospel conquers in the face of opposition.

We are happy to report a substantial increase in the work. During the year three new churches have been organized, two of which are in entirely new fields entered in the last year. There has been also an increase of workers as we were able to give eleven licenses to preach to workers as compared with eight last year. One of the greatest blessings during the past year has been the beginning of an outpouring of God's Spirit in Pentecostal power. Fourteen have received the promise of the Father during the past few months. We pray that the blessings shall continue. We are looking forward to a great harvest for Nicaragua. New fields and new doors are before us. Pray that God will help us to possess the land.

GOOD MEETINGS, NORTH MANCHURIA

The first day of Chinese New Year came on January 31 of our calendar; it was at this time that our assembly here in Harbin set out as one body in a special effort in evangelism, holding three meetings daily for sixteen days. The first meeting of the day was our usual morning watch and Bible

hour from six to seven in the morning. This meeting has continued now for nearly four years, proving to be a real blessing to many in rooting and grounding them in the things of God.

Beginning at noon each day a meeting was held till two o'clock in an effort to reach the unsaved. While the Word was being given forth in the hall by volunteer workers (both men and women) we had some on the outside inviting and urging the people to come in and hear the good news. As the people came and went we handed them tracts. Many came in to these meetings and heard the gospel for the first time.

In the evening the hall was well filled with eager listeners—mainly well-dressed young men, clerks and business managers who took advantage of the New Year's holiday to visit the house of God. On February 13 twenty-one souls (nineteen men and two women) were dedicated to the Lord in Christian baptism at the noon meeting. In the evening of the same day over eighty believers took part in the Lord's Supper, at which time the newly-baptized were welcomed into our fellowship.

On the last night of the special meetings we had a great testimony meeting when eighty-six men and women stood to testify for the Lord and his wonderful salvation. At the close of the service as we stood in one unbroken line with hands joined, shouting and praising the Lord, three of our young converts were gloriously filled with the Holy Ghost, making a total of ten who received the fullness during the special meetings.

NEWS FROM CHINA

Out of letters from two of our lady missionaries in North China we pass on to our readers these few paragraphs, giving an idea of the hardships under which the mis-

sionaries are so faithfully carrying on these days, and also God's gracious protection and care over them. Henrietta Tielman writes:

"Since we have had no postal service for the past three months and don't know how long it will be before we can get our mail through to Ta Chang, please send our mail to Brother Bard and if there is no other way we will have to make trips to Peiping occasionally to get it. I had to come down to get some money as I had borrowed until there was no way to borrow more. There is no regular passenger train service now between here and Shansi, but through the kindness of the Japanese military we secured a pass to ride on their train to the junction where we could buy a third class ticket. We rode on an open box car almost two days and one night. It was quite cold but I have become accustomed to the cold this year as I have had to be on the road so much.

"The Lord has been very gracious to us in Ta Chang and we were able to take in around two hundred refugees. We had two and three services a day besides the children's meetings. Many people who otherwise had no time for services or could not leave their homes, had to leave at this time and had an opportunity to listen to the Word of God.

"This past Christmas was to my mind the most wonderful one I ever had. All of the external that we so often rejoice in was taken away so we as a large family simply rejoiced in the great gift of God."

Ministry Under War Conditions

Grace Nicholson writes: "We are not having meetings at night now in the church because the people are afraid to come out, so I have started a little service in my dining room in the late afternoon. Gideon is giving us lessons from the Word and the Lord is meeting us in prayer.

"Japanese and other troops have been passing through here—thousands of them—together with hundreds of horses drawing wagons and carts filled with guns and ammunition. These soldiers have broken into many homes, helped themselves to what they wanted and burned the benches for firewood. Now many of the women and children have fled to the villages while the men remain to guard their homes. God is wonderfully keeping us. He has blessed and protected the Puchi Christians and their homes. We have untold opportunities to give out the gospel. Do pray for a harvest of precious souls."

BAPTIZING IN SOUTH INDIA

It is a great blessing to see Indian converts step out for the Lord in following Him through the waters of baptism. In many ways this is the final move from the world and religions of the East; therefore,

this step is taken sometimes after much hesitation. Immersion is quite new to many of the people of this section of India and they do not understand it, for they know nothing but sprinkling as a mode of baptism. One of them, a young man who was formerly a Roman Catholic, has come out of darkness into the marvelous light of the Cross of Christ. Two of them were young Tamilians who had been attending the meetings for some time. One of these two is a school teacher. Then there were three young women and another young man whom the Lord has blessed and led into His truth.

A few days ago we gathered on the bank of a river near by for the service. There

Writing From China

I am now happy to be able to write you from Tsinan. Miss Ladner and I left Tientsin February 10 and on the evening of the fourteenth we arrived at Tsinan. We crossed the Yellow River on a new bridge built by the Japanese and could see the old bridge near by in ruins. Since arriving home we have learned that this new bridge was bombed on the fifteenth—the day after we crossed—and greatly damaged and some people were killed. We were indeed led of God as to when to return, and protected on the way.

Our city of Tsinan is under martial law in the evenings; therefore, nobody dares to venture out on the streets at night. We found our native workers and some refugees living in the compound all safe and well. No damage had been done to the place. We listened with interest to the various testimonies given by different ones about how God had protected the mission and them when there was danger and destruction all around.

I'm greatly pleased and encouraged over the spiritual progress among the Christians. Our native evangelist and his wife have been working faithfully in our absence. The refugees living in our mission compound for protection have been converted and also several of our neighbors and others in the city. Oh, what tragic stories we hear every day, heart-rending in the extreme, yet the corresponding marvelous deliverances of God bring joy and comfort to our hearts.—Helen Gustavson.

The Sunday School Lesson

The Calling of the Twelve Disciples

Lesson for May 1. Lesson text: Mark 3:13-21; 6:7-13

The inner circle. "And he ordained twelve, that they should be with him." 3:14. In the old Holiness hymn books there is a beautiful hymn entitled, *Are You in the Inner Circle?* The reader will derive much blessing if he will follow this thought of the "Inner Circle of Fellowship," as the New Testament portrays its development. First, there were the "great multitudes" that followed Him (Matt. 8:1), but these vast crowds eventually grew much smaller. Cf. John 6:66. We come down to the "seventy" (Luke 10:1), then from seventy to "twelve," as in our lesson of today. The twelve in turn narrowed down to the inner circle of "three," Peter, James, and John. Cf. Mark 5:37; 9:2. And might we not trace it one step further to the "one" who leaned on Jesus' breast?

Why this process of selection? Does the Lord have favorites? Is He a respecter of persons? When wheat is sifted, the lightest of the chaff is first blown away. If the sifting continues, even the light grains among the wheat kernels will be blown away, and what remains to the last will be the weightiest, the best of the wheat. Even so it is in the sifting process of the spiritual life. We often sing:

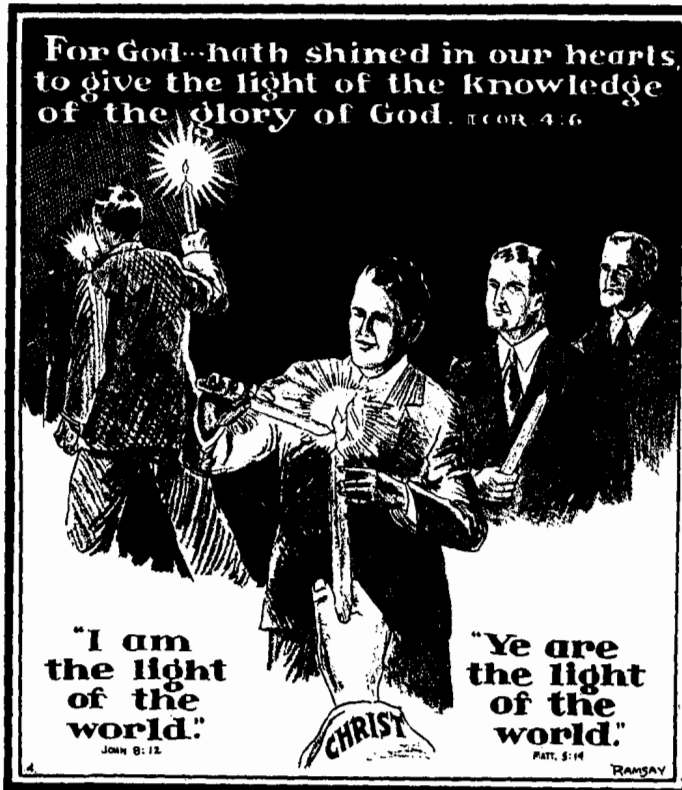
Many once started to run in this race,
But with our Redeemer they could not keep pace;
Others accepted because it was new.
But not very many seem set to go through.

These seem to be sifting days. In not many places are great multitudes flocking into the kingdom. Of Christ we read, "Whose fan is in his hand, and he will thoroughly purge his floor, and gather his wheat into the garner." God keep us in the Inner Circle.

The Little Rock (not Arkansas). "And Simon he surnamed Peter." 3:16. "I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter (Greek, Petros, a little rock), and upon this rock (Greek, Petra, a great mass of rock, the Rock of Ages, Jesus Christ, the Son of God) I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." Peter is the little rock, Christ is the great mass of Rock. "As he is, so are we," not in quantity but in kind; therefore Peter, a partaker of his Lord's nature, is "a little bit of Rock," and so are we, His followers.

The sons of thunder. 3:17. And James and John He surnamed "Boanerges, which is, The sons of thunder." When the Samaritan

villagers would not receive the Lord, these sons of thunder, demonstrating the wherefore of their name, said, "Lord, wilt thou that we command fire to come down from heaven, and consume them?" Luke 9:54. These are days when God's people are greatly desiring to see the gifts of the Spirit manifested. But some gifts may be dangerously misused if first, we do not make sure we have the "fruit of the Spirit." Gal. 5:22, 23. Here, the sons of thunder evidently felt they had sufficient of the gift of miracles to have called



down fire from heaven (they might have called in vain), but their gift needed to be counterbalanced by a fruit. Joseph Smith of England beautifully stated the case when he compared the gifts of the Spirit and the fruit of the Spirit as the two wings of a dove. One wing of nine feathers, to represent the gifts of the Spirit, but what bird can fly with one wing? Neither can the church make proper progress with only the gifts. She needs the other wing, also composed of nine feathers, the ninefold fruit of the Spirit. Possessing both, the dove, the church, may mount up into the heavenlies, fellowshiping with her exalted, risen Lord.

Preach, heal, cast out demons. 3:14, 15. It is instructive to recall how often the Lord links the preaching of the gospel of forgiveness of sins, with the healing of the body. "Bless the Lord, O my soul . . . who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases." Psalm 103:2, 3. We

have also the notable case of last week's Sunday School lesson. Christ first ministered forgiveness of sins to the palsied man, and then healed his body. Notice also, the same association in 1 Peter 2:24 and James 5:14, 15. Demons often need to be cast out, before the demon-oppressed victim can receive the benefits of the gospel, either physically or spiritually. Demons of unbelief, of opposition, of stubbornness, of persistent error, need first to be exorcised before there is room in the heart of the individual for the gospel preaching to find lodgment and germinate. In like manner and for the same reason demons of drunkenness, of drug addiction, of all manner of lustful pleasures, need to be cast out. The Bible also makes a distinction over and over again between actual physical sickness and physical distress which is due, not to a disease but to a demon. Thank the Lord, He has made provision in the gospel of Christ, for deliverance in full in either case.

No purse, no scrip, no money. That this was a temporary and local measure would seem to be indicated by a study of the passage in Luke 22:25-36. The New Testament standard for the support of gospel preachers is clearly set forth by Paul in 1 Cor. 9:1-14, particularly verse 14: "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel."

Repentance. "And they went out, and preached that men should repent." 6:12. "How far is it to the town of Fairfield," asked an early morning traveler of a farmer whom he encountered on the highway. With a twinkle in his eye the farmer replied, "Friend, the way you're headed Fairfield is 24,999½ miles away from you (entirely around the globe), but if you just turn around and go the other way it is a half mile behind you." The word "repent" means to turn. Our Catholic friends like to make this word mean, "to do penance." Thus followers of that faith, especially in this lenten season, think that by denying their carnal flesh certain pleasures, luxuries, and the like, they are doing penance. Later on, after Easter, they indulge in these things again. To repent does not mean such a practice. It means to turn away forever from all sin, from carnality, from anything ungodly, and to turn to the things that make for holiness, for Christlikeness. "As I live, saith the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked; but that the wicked TURN FROM his way and live: turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways; for why will ye die, O house of Israel?" Ezek. 33:11.

"Ye TURNED TO GOD from idols to serve the living and true God; and to wait for his Son from heaven," says Paul, when describing how the Thessalonian Christians repented. 1 Thess. 1:9, 10. Turning over a new leaf, denying ourselves sweets and cigarettes and movies for six weeks, is not repentance. Particularly when the "penitent" can hardly wait for the period of Lent to be

over so he can indulge in those things again. A thing which for a child of God who has really repented is wrong to be used in Lent, should be wrong to use three hundred and sixty-five days in the year. As the little boy put it, "When you repent of your sins, it means that you're not only sorry you did sin, but you're sorry enough to quit sinning." The little fellow was expressing Paul's definition of repentance: "For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of."—Harry Steil.

LESSONS FROM THE POTTER

(Continued from Page One)

the question the angel kept asking him? What is thy name? Poor Jacob wanted a blessing, power, and a touch from God, but it was hard for him to raise his hand and say, "I am Jacob." That was Jacob's place of power. You remember the result. He received a blessing and a precious word from God, "Thy name shall no longer be Jacob, for as a prince thou hast power with God and with men." All want blessing and power, but so few are willing to make full confession. God wants to do wonderful things for us and through us, but no one wants to confess themselves common clay. But that is all we are.

God is so good, so kind! He does not give us a revelation of our natural life just to embarrass us and put us in utter dismay, but

rather that we may see our new life and power in Him, that He might make out of us princes. Praise His name!

And now a little word about the potter. Notice first the sovereign power of God. You remember the verse, Jer. 18:6. To me that verse holds out such a picture of His might and the greatness of His plan and purpose and His absolute control over the clay. Then I like to read with it Isa. 64:8; quoted at the beginning of this article. See the difference? This holds hope and comfort rather than a cheerless picture of absolutism or fatalism. We are in the hands of a tender Father, a loving God, a mighty worker.

A word here about His plan. The potter has a purpose for the clay. Back of the shapeless mass He sees a figure of beauty which His hand is shaping and patiently creating. God has an eternal purpose for every life. The act of consecration or sanctification, is only the beginning. It merely brings us more perfectly into the plan, and makes it possible for Him to really work out His highest and best. Your Pentecost is not the climax or end, it is the beginning of a precious life in the Spirit. I like to think of life as the river of time that sweeps down over the ages. The people are the banks of this river, and God the Lord stoops down and picks up the little pieces of clay which make up the banks. He picks them up and moulds them as He pleases. Some of the clay is along the water's edge, and some up on the bank high and dry, yet He has a thought for all. Does He seem long in developing them? Read for comfort, Jer. 29:11; Psalm 139:15-18.

What a privilege to have such wisdom and power working for us! It is wise to say, "Lord, not my will but thine be done."

Have you ever watched the workers in a pottery? The workman stands before a wheel which revolves at terrific speed, a great many revolutions a minute. On this wheel He works the clay. As it spins round and round He presses and works it into the desired form. It is necessary to bring the wheel into every position so the potter can conveniently accomplish his purpose. This represents the various experiences and vicissitudes of life which come to us in the providence of God. There are joys, sorrows, trials, heartaches and misunderstandings. And so the wheel turns, the clay revolves, and the Potter's hand presses, moulds and works. Thus the providence of God becomes as sanctifying as His grace, and we learn at length to say, "We know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are called according to His purpose."

There is a lesson here of the tenderness of God in His love for our souls. "We are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works." No hand but His own is permitted to touch the delicate and exquisite work of sanctifying a human soul. And I dare say no human artist ever watched with so good, care or love the evolving of some choice design of grace and skill, than God does as He works out the perfection of the vessels of His grace. Perhaps we do not see anything very valuable in our own hearts or the hearts of others, but He must have seen the value or He never would have sent the Holy Spirit to dwell in us to form, shape and fashion us into His image.

But the vessel was marred in the hand of the potter. What made the vessel break just as it seemed so perfect, so lovely and beautiful? There was a little piece of stone, a tiny pebble, or a piece of dry leaf or stick, something not pliable or yielded. It ruined all his work, and the fractured vessel is taken from the wheel and thrown aside. It seems all has been in vain. This picture is sadly true to life, for the human vessel has indeed been marred. The fall of man seemed at first like a fatal blight upon all the work of God.

But the prophet tells us, "He made it again another vessel even as it pleased the potter to make." God was not surprised or baffled even at the dreadful failure of man, but instantly He began to reveal that wonderful plan of redemption which had been prepared before the ages. Have you ever found any foreign substance in the clay of your nature? Have you broken and felt a failure? Praise God for it. Perhaps you were surprised at some of the breaking and the causes for the same, but He was not surprised. Nor is He discouraged. He is working. All of the old saints who meant anything to God had to break, and sometimes more than once. Everyone who wants to go on with God has to break down in His hands, and see the material of which he is made. Jacob became a prince after he found out how to break and yield to God. How beautiful to see the patient love of God as He worked out the pattern of his life.

Look at Moses as he begins his life with ill-considered zeal, and then flies from the effect of his recklessness. For forty years he is turned round and round like a potter's vessel in the desert of Midian. Finally he is ready for the great work to which God had called him, and he meets the commission with shrinking modesty instead of the reckless presumption with which he had sprung to the front forty years before.

Look at Elijah as God turns him round and round on the potter's wheel, showing alternately his weakness and his strength. Finally he too is ready and he is taken up in a chariot of fire; and like a benediction we have from that strange life the gentle and mighty Elisha.

Look at Simon Peter. I like Peter because he was so perfectly human, so perfectly natural—just clay. He was marred in the hands of the potter until at last it seemed the clay was shivered into fragments and never could be used again. But we see that out of it all came a chastened and victorious life, prepared by its very failure for the path of crucifixion. We may have to break many times before we get into any place where God can use us. But God is with us while we break, holding us lest we fall apart, watching that the fragments are not lost along the wayside.

In the early days of Pentecost we used to hear a great deal about breaking in God's hands, surrendering our wills, yielding our lives to His control, dying to the self-life, and overcoming. How beautiful it all sounds in a prayer-meeting or when lifted up by a mighty touch of the Spirit! But how different is the process when God calls upon us and tries to work out in actual experience the prayers we so frequently pray. How the old life holds on to its name, dignity, calling and

place, and how it struggles (in a nice way) to preserve itself.

Our desire to die to the self life, and the general result when God gives us an opportunity to yield, brings to mind an incident in the life of a friend of mine. One day when a child she and her sister had not been obedient, and were to receive punishment. While the mother was attending to one child, the other sat on a chair crying and thinking of her dreadful abuse. Her little bosom was full of self-pity and thoughts of her mistreatment, so she cried out, "O just kill me, just shoot me, shoot me!" She thought she was so abused. A neighbor woman hearing the disturbance, and seeing the situation in its proper light, thought she would help the child out in her desire to depart this life, so

taking an old shotgun, unloaded, not having been fired in fifteen years, she rushed into the house and asked where the person was who wanted to be shot? Of course it had its desired effect in quieting that child, for she suddenly resolved to remain on earth; and having no desire just then to see her neighbor, she flew out of the kitchen, through the garden, past the barn to a great haystack which just then seemed to afford her comfort and shelter. She remained there the rest of the day. Friends, have you in your Christian experience ever run to a haystack? Have you ever prayed that you might die to the self-life, but when God opened a very promising way to do so, you made an escape (often hastily) to a comforting haystack? Self-pity, a moist-eyed creature, lurks there, and as long as you linger and are willing to be coddled by her, just so long you will hinder God and lose out in overcoming.

And now a word about the decorations on the vessels. Not long ago I visited an artist as he worked on some choice pieces of pottery. I was much surprised to find the

vases he had apparently finished and placed on a shelf to be fired, looked so crude and inartistic as to color. The forms were very symmetrical, with fine lines and graceful curves, but the colors were very unlike real artistic taste. But I kept quiet and soon learned a precious lesson. The work was perfectly correct, the colors were *exactly* the needed ones, but I was ignorant as to the *outcome*. God is doing the same thing today. He is now decorating His people and putting on the colors, the patterns, and designs. Those who are not artists (have no discernment as to spiritual things) cannot understand. We look so strange; we are so peculiar; we are so narrow; we let people run over us; we do not fight for our rights; etc. Never mind, the Lord is the artist and He is only putting on the decorations. Our turn will come some time. Sometimes we or our work looks so drab, or gray, or dingy. There is no *open* and manifest showing of power, no great doings. We feel uneasy, and think there must be a mistake or failure or error. Yet, there is none and we *are* conscious of a sweet fellowship with the Lord. We are unable to *explain* just *why* things are as they appear in the Assembly, or sometimes in the lives of the saints. God lets us *appear* in such strange lights and does not explain to everybody *why* He is doing so. Never mind. He is putting on the decorations. Again you may be bright and appear cheerful and gay, and be greatly blessed, but in spirit be very much burdened and unable to explain the apparent paradox. Just more of the colors. Let people say what they will, judge you thus or so, it matters not—walk before God and let Him do with you as He pleases. In the end it will be to His glory and also to your blessing.

And now just a word about the firing. The pieces of pottery, as I said, were set aside for firing. They were beautiful in form and line but horrible in color. They were then placed in the oven and the heat turned on. How it burned, burned, burned! How hot, you ask? 2,000 degrees! Have you been in the fire? Did you ever feel all seeming touch of God lifted and you set aside? Praise God for it. The fire is what does the work. Later I saw the vases taken from the oven—what vessels of beauty! The form was the same, but the crude colors had all been changed by the *action of the heat*, and now each one seemed a bit more choice than the other as the delicate tints and rich shades of color played in the decoration.

How unfinished the work would have been, and the thought of the artist never would have been developed or given to the world, had not the *fire* done its work. Friends, do not shrink from the fire of God. He has chosen you to make out of your life something rich and beautiful. Do not expect people, or even your nearest friends to understand you, for God is jealous of you and will purposely make the fire so hot that you will in haste *hide* in Him. But always remember God understands, and will one day bring forth a company tried and perfect. **Hallelujah!** Some day He will be able, if we are true in the tests, to make clear the discipline, the breaking, the colors, and the firing, and present us by His grace transformed into the image of His own Son. Amen.

COTTER, ARK.—We praise the Lord for the visitation of His blessing and power in the revival just closed here. 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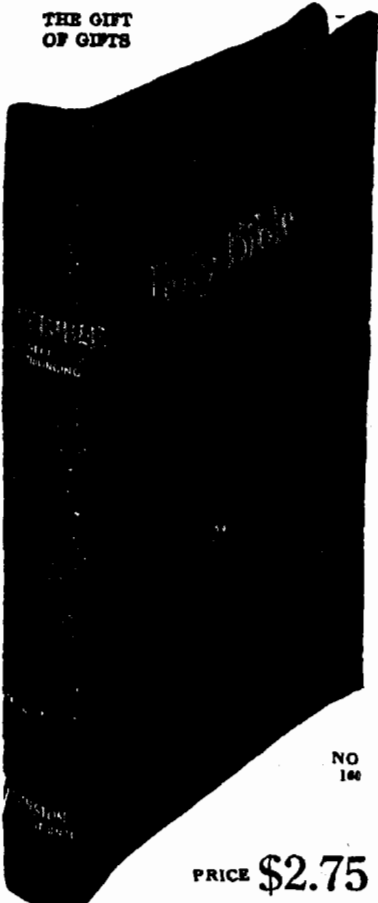
