# C.S. Lewis lives!

Fantasy is alive and well. Witness the success of the movie versions of Tolkein's *Lord of the Rings*, and the Harry Potter books and movies. These are soon to be joined by a new movie version of *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*, the first to be published of the Chronicles of Narnia by Christian writer C.S. Lewis (1895-1963). This new release of a major movie gives church librarians a fine opportunity to attract new readers to the library and to introduce them to some of Lewis's major books. ("If you like the Harry Potter books, you might want to try the Chronicles of Narnia.")

Throughout his career as a university teacher of literature at Oxford and Cambridge, Lewis wrote dozens books. Some were academic works of literary criticism; many were works related to the Christian faith to which Lewis was reconverted at the age of 33.

## How to read Narnia

In 1955 Lewis published the first of the Chronicles of Narnia, *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrohe,* to be followed by six succeeding volumes. In the original boxed set, the books were numbered in the order in which they were published. The new set by Harper numbers the books according to their Narnian chronology of events, beginning with *The Magician's Nephew*, the history of the creation of Narnia. This chronological order is the one Lewis himself recommended:

- 1. The Magician's Nephew
- 2. The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe
- 3. The Horse and His Boy
- 4. Prince Caspian
- 5. The Voyage of the "Dawn Treader"
- 6. The Silver Chair
- 7. The Last Battle

The books are rich in Christian themes and symbols and appeal to children (ages 6 to 12), teens, and adults. For that reason they make fine reading aloud in the family. The series has been enormously successful, having sold 30 million copies in print form, as well as in CDs, DVDs, and audiotapes. PBS Videos offers excellent dramatizations of four of the Chronicles.

Ah, the holidays! Cake, pie, candy, and cookies! Yummy! Cleaning up all those



sweet crumbs is a good time to think about cleaning up the cookies in your computer. How you delete cookies depends upon your operating

system and browser.

## Deleting cookies Internet Explorer 4.x or later:

- 1. From the View menu, select Internet Options.
- 2. Click the Settings button, and then click View Files.
- 3. From the View select Details.
- 4. Click Internet Address to arrange the list so all the cookie files are together.
- 5. Select the cookie files and delete.

Follow the same steps for Internet Explorer 5.x but before proceeding to step two, notice the "Temporary Internet Files" section and click the Settings button. Follow the remaining steps. Explorer 6.x makes the process easy, combining elements from previous versions. From the Start menu, choose Control Panel, then Internet Options. Locate the "Temporary Internet Files" section and click "Delete Cookies."

## Netscape or Mozilla users

From Tools, select Options, and then Privacy. In Privacy, display the Cookies category (double-click on it if it's not already open). Click View Cookies. The Stored Cookies window opens. Select one or more cookies and click Remove Cookie, or click Remove All Cookies.

## C.S. Lewis lives!, cont. from p. 1

Readers who like the Chronicles of Narnia might want to move next to Lewis's Space Trilogy: *Out of the Silent Planet, Perelandra,* and *That Hideous Strength*. Teenagers might appreciate this set of three sci-fi novels involving space travel and life on other planets.

Some of Lewis's books on Christian faith use fictional techniques. *The Screwtape Letters* presents letters by a senior devil written to a junior tempter on earth, giving him advice on how to win people from The Enemy (God) for Our Father Below (Satan). *Letters to Malcolm: Chiefly on Prayer* also uses the form of letters, this time containing advice on prayer and the Christian life. *The Great Divorce* takes place in hell and heaven. These three can be heartily recommended to teenagers and adults for their fresh insights and ways of expressing the Christian faith.

From here adults and older teens might move to the more reasoned defenses of Christian doctrine like *Mere Christianity*, *Miracles*, and *The Problem of Pain*. Readers who are grieving, especially the death of a spouse, might appreciate Lewis's account of his own mourning in *A Grief Observed*.

For those who want to learn more about the life of C.S. Lewis, a good start is Lewis's spiritual autobiography, *Surprised* by Joy, which includes the story of his reconversion to Christian faith. The best biography is Jack: The Life and Times of C.S. Lewis by his student and friend, George Sayer. The romance of Lewis and Joy Davidman has been dramatized (with some inaccuracies) in Shadowlands, both a BBC and a Hollywood version.

All of Lewis's writings are remarkable for their freshness, warmth and sound counsel on the Christian life. As books that can be read and reread with delight and blessing, they deserve a prominent place in the core collection of any church library. ■





# Library Basics / Vernita Kennen Dealing with challenged materials



Sooner or later every library will have a patron who is unhappy with the materials that are available. They

may object to the author, the content, the language, the photographs, or any of a number of other things about the material. It is vital that every library be proactive and has a written policy that tells how challenged materials will be handled. Knowing that a challenge form must be filled out, (including a statement that the material has been read, viewed or listened to in its entirety) may be enough to nip a challenge in the bud! Our church library has chosen to have a very specific form on which the challenge must be specified in detail. The request must be submitted to the pastor on staff who works with the library. He/she will then seek input from others on the staff and discuss the challenge and his/her recommendation with the members of our Library Action Group before a final decision is made. The decision shall be based on the selection policy of the library and the specifics of the challenge. The final decision is that of the pastor.

The pastor is the person who discusses the decision with the person(s) making the challenge or request for reconsideration. If the challenge is upheld, the item shall be

removed from the library collection, not just from circulation.

Don't be caught in the unfortunate situation of having something challenged without both a policy on challenged materials and a selection policy that spells out in detail the criteria on which the library chooses to add materials, both print and nonprint. We all hope that we never have to use these policies but it is far better to be proactive and prepared.

# Request for Reconsideration of Library Materials

A form with the following information is requested by our library committee when someone wishes to file a challenge:

- Author, title, publisher, copyright date
- Name of person request is initiated by
- Telephone, street and e-mail address

- Do you represent others than yourself? If so, whom?
- What do you object to in the material?
- What of value is there in this material?
- For what age group would you recommend this work?
- Are you aware of the judgment of this book by critics?
- Are you aware of why this book was purchased?
- What do you believe is the theme or purpose of this material?
- What would you like the Library Action Committee to do about this material?
- In its place, what work of equal value would you recommend that convey as valuable a picture and perspective of society or set of values?
- The challenger is then asked to sign and date a statement reading, "I have read/listened to or viewed the entire material in question." ■

## BIOGRAPHY

THE FANNY CROSBY DVD 264.2 STORY, 46 min., DVD or VHS, Vision Video, 2004, 156-364-7338, \$19.99



"Blessed Assurance", "To God Be the Glory", and "A Wonderful Savior," are among the well-known hymns written by Fanny Crosby and beloved by many Christians. Blinded in infancy by

medical incompetence, this remarkable woman achieved success as a poet and is the author of nearly 10,000 hymns.

This documentary unfolds the amazing life of the girl who, in 1835, leaves home to attend the New York Institution for the Blind. Gifted with exceptional memory, she graduates and then teaches at the institution. Crosby befriends U.S. presidents and becomes the first woman to address a joint session of Congress. In later years she championed the New York City poor in the slums of the Bowery district.

The video uses photos, drama, and comments by professors and experts to bring Crosby's story to life. The Fanny Crosby Story is the debut episode of a new series, Testimony: Life Changing Stories About People of Faith. With the phrase 24/7 coming into usage in our culture, Sabbath Keeping could not be more timely reading. This book serves as an excellent companion for anyone-individual or in a group—who wants to begin or is already engaged in this spiritual practice.

The writing is centered on the author's spiritual journey and that of his family. This adds an important dimension to help readers relate to the rest of the text. Scripture quotes begin each chapter, and additional quotes are scattered throughout. Helpful questions for reflection, discussion and journaling conclude each chapter. Two appendices include Jewish Sabbath Prayers, a list of recommended reading, and source and Scripture indices. -Ann Potthoff, St Paul MN

## **ETHICS**

Bonhoeffer. Dietrich 241 ETHICS, 593p, hardcover, Dietrich Bonhoeffer Works (Vol. 6), Fortress Press, 2005, 0-8006-8306-4, \$55

In one of his letters from prison, Bonhoeffer wrote: "I for my part have been reproaching myself for not having finished the Ethics." One can argue that he did finish it by living it rather than by writing. However, the fact remains that what he believed would be his crowning work was never completed.

This current work, Ethics, is volume six of the recently published series, Dietrich Bonhoeffer Works, and is comprised of manuscripts that have been reconstructed, so to speak, and put in a sequence that differs from previous compilations.

1943 is relevant to chaplain ministry and special memorial observances, its greater role is to lift up the larger issues of ecumenical cooperation, self-sacrifice, and inclusiveness. This moving account of the USAT Dorchester's last voyage tells the stories of four chaplains - Jewish, Catholic, Methodist and Dutch-Reformed; historical context that contrasts their actions with those of their countrymen; dramatic film footage; personal interviews of survivors; and commentary by military chaplains. Despite the disturbing message, it reassures us that good exists. It gently prompts the viewer to consider the big questions: Could you give up your life jacket for another? Do you love your neighbor, regardless of faith or ethnic background? The DVD offers a downloadable pdf study guide with materials for several class discussions and Web sites for further information. Marilynne Robinson is a brilliant writer who truly inhabits the soul of her fictitious, dying Midwest preacher in the 1950's small Iowa town of Gilead. Our preacher, John Ames, writes a letter, his legacy to his young son, and presents to us his external and internal life experiences. He writes his thoughts wherever they take him on the life journeys of his grandfather, his father, and his own before and after his recent marriage and fatherhood in old age. The Hebrew word for Gilead is "stronghold", as this fictitious town so aptly represents to Ames, his family and his friends. If you are looking for a beach book with action or steamy love, you may find this book boring. It's a contemplative work on the life of a pious old man that is not for everyone. As for me, I found it to be very moving, well-written, spiritual, quiet, tender, wise, profound, philosophical, amazing, awesome — a masterpiece! Even if you are somewhere in between in your own critique of *Gilead*, you surely will agree that it is a powerful testimony on the power and grace of faith. A book to be savored, shared and remembered, it begs to be discussed in book groups.

This book is a winner! It has earned the 2005 Pulitzer Prize, 2004 National Book Critics Circle, and 2005 Christianity Today Book Award. ■

Swedish author Bo Grietz's classic novel has been republished with an additional translated chapter. Set within a Swedish parish, the book is comprised of a series of three novellas that take place in 1810, 1880, and 1940.

In each novella, the central character is a young Lutheran pastor trying to adjust to the parish and solidify his beliefs. Each wrestles with the theological concept of salvation, and whether it results from good behavior or God's grace. Throughout the stories, real-life events shape their views. Interestingly, each of the pastors learns as much if not more from his parishioners as from his more senior counterparts.

Although the story unfolds in a Lutheran setting, this novel successfully brings theology into everyday terms, making it a good addition for any church library.

What can a devout evangelical pastor do when he concludes that the mega-church he serves has misunderstood the essence of Christianity? Pastor Lamblove comes across as a combination of the prophet Hosea and reformer Martin Luther. He calls his fellow pastors and the congregation to a modern Reformation, to turn from a "me, me, me" focus to a communal focus — the realization that "God's plan is not about you. It is about the whole world." He is passionate and blunt, bravely articulating an alternative evangelical theology.

This entertaining, satiric novel also targets Christian entanglement with popular culture and the end-time theology of the Left Behind series. Uproariously funny in places, it goes beyond amusing. The author frames the conflict that committed evangelical Christians face as they attempt to bridge the chasm between faith and culture in order to spread the Gospel—and provides a startling interpretation of the Book of Revelation. ■



This documentary, hosted by folksinger Judy Collins, is a powerful portrayal of families who have lost a member to suicide. Dr. Kay Redfield

Jameson of Johns Hopkins University provides mental health expertise. Through a series of interviews, Fierce Goodbye explores both practical and profound questions. There are viewpoints from the Protestant, Catholic, Jewish, and Greek Orthodox faiths. To the film's credit, it advances the idea that suicide is not a sin any more or less terrible than any other; therefore, God has already forgiven them. However, I found even this to be deeply disturbing. Suicide occurs as a result of unrelieved depression. People with other illnesses are not considered sinners. Those who take their own life should be viewed as persons who have run out of options. Despite this flaw, *Fierce Goodbye* serves as an excellent starting point for discussions within congregations not only among relatives of survivors, but for all in the supporting faith community. The DVD version includes a useful pdf study guide. -Ann Potthoff, St Paul MN

Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, Guard the bed I lie upon. Four pillars round my bed; Four angels round my bead.

One to watch, one to pray, And two to keep me till the day. Amen

By using her first childhood prayer as a guideline, Sprague succeeded in giving me a better understanding of the four gospels and of the men who wrote them. *One to Watch, One to Pray* tells the story of how the Gospels came to be written and how they are related to each other. Sprague explains in layperson's terms how and why these stories of Jesus have always been at the heart of the faith of the Christian Church. A chapter is devoted to each Gospel author explaining which one is to watch, which one to pray, and which two to keep me till the day.

This insightful discussion of seasons of friendship among women of every culture, and their spiritual stages of life and community involvement is a beautifully balanced, readable account of the inner motivations and needs of two women of the Bible. Bankson's discussion of how women of all ages can blend friendship inspires hope and provides guidance.

This book is an excellent tool for women's groups or individual reading. Guides at the end of each chapter outline women's roles in community or in any balanced friendship. For a growing ministry seeking to engage mature women, this book would be a real asset. What is Bankson's view of the Gospel in action?: God is love; God's will is love; our obedience should be based on love. Recommended.

Ariarajah, S. Wesley 261.873 AXIS OF PEACE: Christian Faith in Times of Violence and War, 144p, paper, World Council of Churches Publications, 2004, 2-8254-1394-1, \$15

In a world permeated with violence and war, *Axis of Peace* comes to peace-makers as a sports drink to an athlete — refreshingly nutritious. Ariarajah is from Sri Lanka where he was a Methodist pastor. He is a former WCC staffer, and is presently a professor at Drew University.

From his global background, Ariarajah examines the roots of war and violence, and the symbiosis of culture, religion, and patriotism. He discusses the current Iraq war, other wars, even the wars of Bible times. He presents peace as a goal that God set for us, a goal that holy writings of many faiths affirm.

Peace is a surprisingly complex subject, and Ariarajah does a superlative job of unraveling the tangles while being clear, interesting, comprehensive, objective, and forthright. *Axi*, is not a study guide, but could be used as such, and is an excellent addition to church libraries. ■ —Dolores Klinsky Walker, Pioneer United Methodist, Walla Walla WA

People who take the Bible seriously will want to live in a society organized around statements like these. But, as Jim Wallis points out in this challenging, informative, troubling book, the policies that currently govern our lives in the United States are directly contrary to the teachings of Jesus and the Old Testament prophets.

There is no peace. The gap between rich and poor is increasing, racial and economic injustices abound—all in a nation that considers itself very religious! Don't look to the political parties for a solution for as the cover's tagline tells us "Why the Right Gets It Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It."

My name is Ninette Speights, Library Director of Ingalls Avenue Baptist Church in Pascagoula, MS. Our church received much damaged from Katrina and four feet of water swept through our buildings. We lost 95% of all the contents of the church. Our media library and teacher's resource rooms were a complete loss. More than 3,000 books, videos, DVD, computer, TVs, VCRs, DVD players, fwmishings, shelves and more were swept away and flooded.
