Jesus

- * Identify more easily with Jesus, especially baby Jesus.
- * 2-3 year olds can learn that Jesus is the son of God.
- * That he was once a child like they are (avoid "past" events.)

Bible

* Pleasant experiences and hearing Bible stories are the first step toward developing a love for God's special book.

Church

- * Church is a place to learn about God and to see friends.
- * As they visit church, they can come to know it as a loving and caring place where God's people come to share God's love.

Prayer

- * Can be taught simple table or bedtime prayers before snacktime or naptime.
- * They will give thanks for all things.
- * Simple Bible songs can also help toddlers learn to pray.
- * Children at this age love music and the opportunity to dance and play.

What About Curriculum?

- * Understand that in reading scriptures to babies and young children, you are filling them, even though they may not be capable of intellectually comprehending the words you speak.
- * No structured curriculum for 0-2 year olds.
- * Select major concepts or themes that will be emphasized.
- * Avoid temptation to use secular books or curriculum.

THE FACILITIES

1. To encourage learning we need to provide the right atmosphere.

A. Room Arrangement

- * Best location for your nursery:
 - Near the sanctuary or next to an entrance and parking lot.
 - Near a bathroom.
 - On the ground floor with easy access to an outdoor exit.
 - If possible provide close parking from families and pre-schoolers.
- * Avoid locations:
 - Close to long stairways.
 - Rooms without access to outdoor exits.
 - With doors or exits leading to a busy street.
 - Attics
- * Infants and toddlers should be separated. The number of babies and toddlers you have will determine the number of rooms you will need or the layout of a large room.
- * Rooms should be spacious, clean, warm and comfortable.
- Ventilation is very important. Maintain temperature between 68 -78 F.
- * Rectangular, 900-100 sq. ft. is adequate, 300 sq. ft. minimum. (25-35 sq. ft./1 child and 1 caregiver.)
- * Soft natural lighting throughout the room; avoid glare.
- * Ideally floor should be a high density synthetic carpet with substantial rubber backing or a nonporous cushioned vinyl with nonskid rugs. Set up a regular schedule of cleaning and de-germing carpets. Removing shoes will help a lot.
- * Adequate number of exits essential for emergencies.
- * Half doors at doorways with safety doorknobs, over which the children may be passed are ideal.
- * Ceiling should be covered with acoustical tile or plaster to reduce sound; walls should be sound proofed, well insulated and painted with nontoxic paint preferably in soft colors.

The Nursery Can Be The Most Dangerous Room In Your Church

What do you get when you mix one hand-me-down walker, three used toys and a chipped crib? A dangerous place.

And that could be your church nursery. Last year more than 80,000 kids younger than 5 were rushed to emergency rooms, reports the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. Churches could steer clear of a lot of accidents if they inspected nurseries for potential problems and trained the people who staff them.

How safe is your church nursery? Form a nursery committee and look for these warning signs:

B. Safety Guidelines

- Is a smoke detector installed? Are the batteries good?
- Is a fire extinguisher handy?
- Is the first aid kit stocked and available?
- Post emergency information on a bulletin board.
- Never administer medicine to any child. Have phone numbers for a local poison control center, 911 and hospital emergency department posted.
- Be sure room is child proofed.
- Vision to every part of room should be unobstructed.

Dangerous Objects

- Vacuum or sweep floor regularly.
- All sharp corners protected.
- Electrical outlets should be installed out of a child's reach or covered with safety plugs.
- Supervise use of crayons, playdough, chalk, etc.
- Safety latches on cabinets and drawers.
- Furniture and shelves secured to walls.
- Toy chest lids.
- Cover any floor heaters or radiators.

Suffocation

- Keep all plastic bags out of reach.
- Do diaper pails have secure lids? Children have died by falling head-first into a diaper pail.
- Never prop a bottle in any baby's mouth.
- Don't let babies suck or chew on balloons, small objects or large pieces of food.
- No loose cords, strings, or ropes within a child's reach.

Falls

- Never leave a baby unattended on a changing table or on a swing.
- Secure crib sides whenever a baby is inside.
- Don't allow children to climb on tables or chairs.
- Windows should be shatterproof glass with bottom sill a minimum of 2 ft. from the floor.
- Never place climbing equipment near windows.
- Make sure all rugs are secured to the floor.

Special Areas Within Room

- Area for nursing mothers with privacy and a rocking chair.
- Quiet area for toddlers.

Decorating Ideas

- Bulletin boards, posters and murals, mobiles, pictures of babies, etc. are some ways to decorate walls.
- Bulletin boards can have monthly themes for children and another board for general information.

C. Basic Supplies

- * Laundered items:
 - Crib sheets, receiving blankets, smocks for caregivers, extra items of clothing.
- * Purchased items:
 - Disposable diapers (all sizes), pre-moistened wipes, plastic gloves, wax paper sheets, tissue paper, plastic bags for soiled cloths or cloth diapers, paper towels, soap for washing hands, disinfectant (1:10), snacks if provided, tape and items for labeling children and belongings.

Equipment for the Nursery

- * Cribs (made after 1973), slats must be 2-3/8" apart max. with snug fitting mattress and bumper pad for cribs.
- * Playpens in infant room.
- * Rocking chairs in infant rooms only.
- * Changing tables(s), shelf or cabinets for diaper changing supplies.
- * Covered diaper pail.
- * Wastebasket.
- * Diaper bag shelves or hooks on walls, coat rack.
- * Baby swing(s) in infant room.
 - Don't use for babies less than 6 weeks. Always use safety strap and never leave baby unattended.
- * Cassette player and tapes.
- * Low table and chairs in toddler room.
- Shelves for books and toys.
- * Optional equipment could include: Small refrigerator, bottle warmers, communication system to sanctuary for use in case of emergency.
- * Avoid walkers and jumpers. 20,500 children were injured from these in 1990.

Books and Toys

- * Many on market are dangerously unsafe.
- * Play only with objects too large to swallow (larger than 2" in diameter).
- * Use toys that are unbreakable and easy to wash.
- * Remove eyes, nose, buttons on stuffed toys or dolls to prevent being pulled off and put in mouth.
- * Avoid anything that cannot be washed.
- * Toys should be made of nonflammable, nontoxic, and lead-free materials.
- * Be sure toys are age appropriate for 0-2 year olds.
- * Check toys for rough, sharp or splintery surfaces.
- * Discard any unrepairable toys or equipment.

Policies and procedures should include the following: security system (tags) during check in/out, bathroom policies, medical procedures, emergencies (fire and earthquake, child abuse, etc.), record keeping and forms, locating parents, snacks, crying, supply areas and inventory, infection control policy and procedures.
- 8. Job description and responsibilities.
- 9. Age-level characteristics (nursery department).
- 10. Nursery forms, tags, brochures.
- 11. Resource room all resources available to equip staff.
- 12. Volunteer application: each volunteer should have a completed application on file in children's ministry office before they are approved to volunteer in a classroom.
- 13. Policy for staffing and scheduling.

* Summary:

- 1. Organization will benefit your entire ministry because the following basic and important needs will have been met:
 - a. You will know the direction and purpose of your nursery ministry.
 - b. You will know the basic chain of command.
 - c. Those involved will know what policy and procedures are.
 - d. Your staff will receive training which will equip them to successfully teach the age level they have been recruited to teach.
 - e. You will know your educational goals (curriculum) and how to
 - f. Your parents and staff will have opportunities to share frustrations, solve problems and plan (training meetings).
